Why require annual surveys for capacity?

□ In 1990, KY had less than five years of capacity;

□ KY received over 1M tons/yr from Northeast U.S.;

□ Owners were not allowing expansion review time;

□ Legislature reasoned landfills would fill quickly.



# 401 KAR 47:190, Sec. 8(2) requires an survey of remaining space:

□ Annually between January 1 and May 1;

□ Normal survey reports due July 1;

□ Aerials due August 1;

Report waste based on 365-day year.



• 401 KAR 47:190, Sec. 8(2) also requires:

• 15 day advance notice to the cabinet;

 Certification by and seal of Professional Engineer or Land Surveyor;

- Cross-Sections on 100-foot centers showing;
  Current waste placement; and
  - Proposed final contours.



- Cabinet uses Annual survey to determine:
- Using daily average tonnage, if waste density near goal of 1200 lbs/CY;
- State-wide remaining capacity in years for annual report to legislature;
- Cross-Sections on 100-foot centers showing;
  - Current waste placement; and
  - Proposed final contours.
- Remaining landfill capacity in cubic yards (CY).

• 2008 Annual Survey Data:

- 271 MCY of remaining permitted airspace;
- 7.8 MCY used in 2007-2008; and

• 35 years capacity




• Why so much space?

 Rules required new landfills by July 1, 1995; and

The average landfill added 10 to 20 years of space;



Capacity Trends:





• Why so much more space?

- Outer Loop (WMI-Louisville) added 63 MCY or 50 site-years in 2004;
- Big Run (Ashland) opened with 8 MCY in 2006; and
- Other landfill expansions.



Possible effects of so much more space?

- KY has fairly low disposal rates avg. \$29.21 per ton;
- Northeast Trash (Big Run, Ashland) and

• Less incentive to recycle, maybe.
